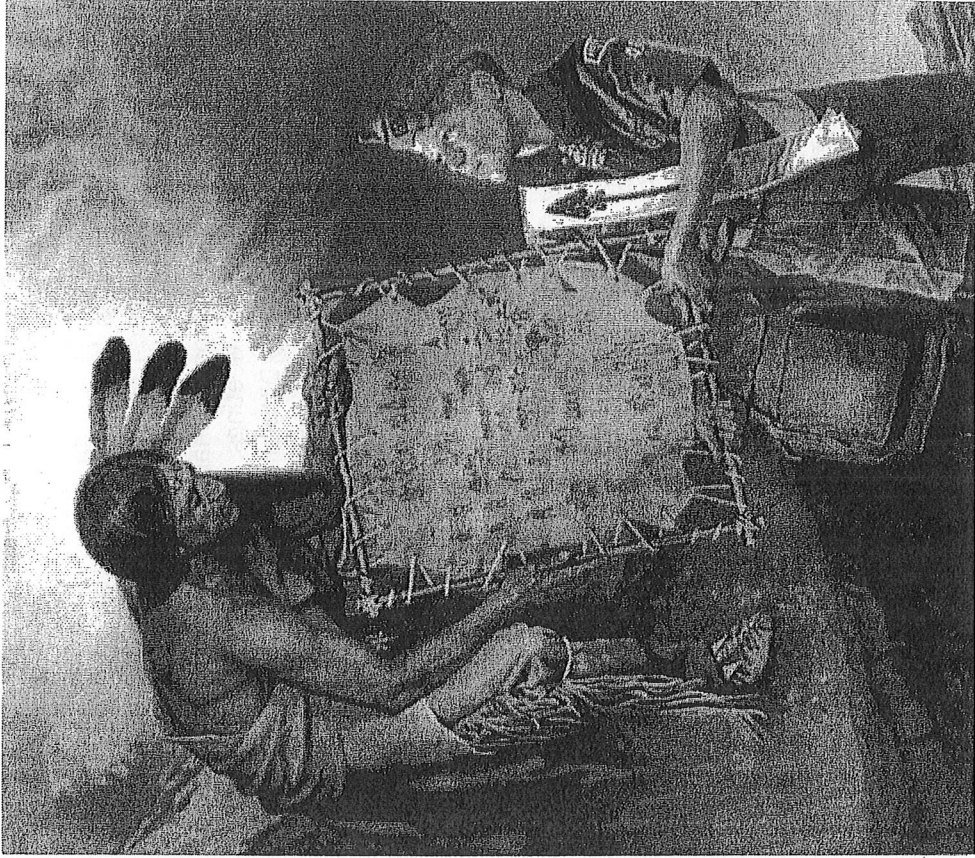

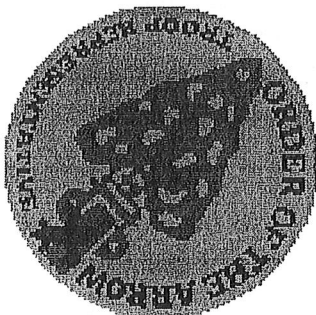


Does your unit have an OA Troop Representative?

Dear Brothers,

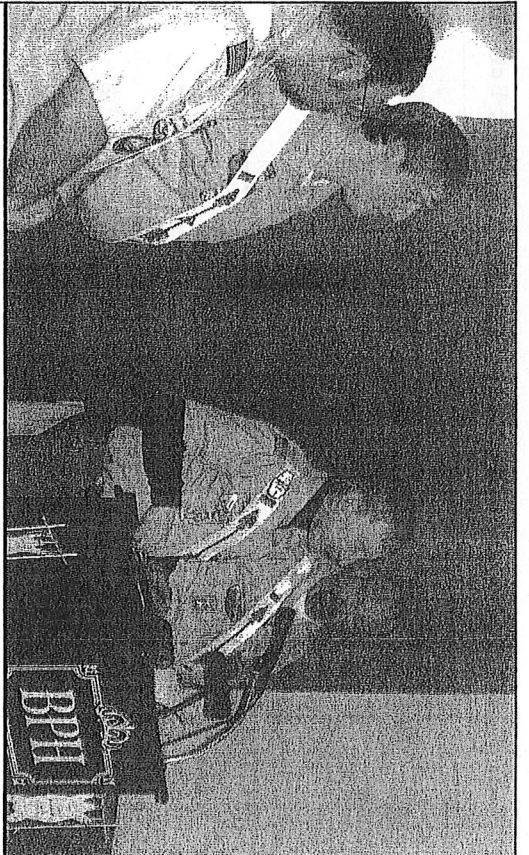

Thank you for the award recognizing Austin as a past Lodge Chief. 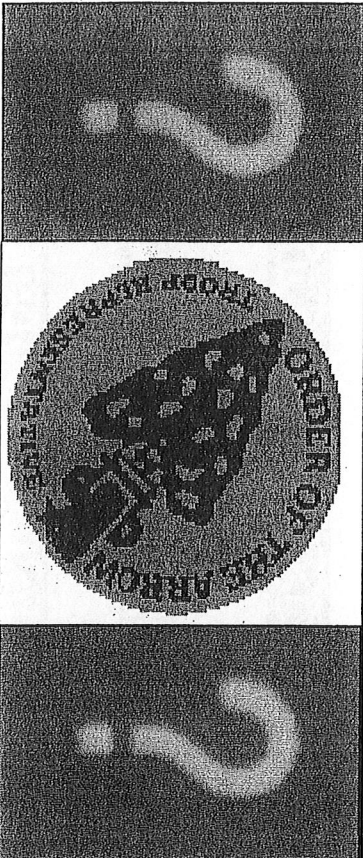

OA TROOP REP'S: WHERE ARE YOU?

Every month our Lodge holds a meeting of the executive committee. Every unit with OA members should have an OA Troop Representative. Unit Representatives should be attending the monthly Lodge Executive Committee meetings. In January there were five youth members present other than lodge officers.

The Order of the Arrow Troop Representative is a troop leadership position. This position is often used to meet advancement requirements for Star or Life. The Troop Representative position holds responsibilities and is more than a patch to wear and an easy office.

Does your OA Troop Representative speak at meetings to share Lodge information? When was the last time your OA Troop Representative attended a Lodge Executive Committee meeting? Ask your Troop Representative about Conclave or NOAC and see if they have anything to share. Ask your OA Troop Representative how much money was raised at our patch auction and donated for camp improvements at Camp Sam Wood. If your OA Troop Representative can't answer those questions, maybe it is time for a new one.



Along the Trail—celebrating 100 years of Scouting

I became an Ordeal member of Lodge #339 at the spring weekend in 1974. That fall, my older brother converted to Brotherhood and my father received the Vigil honor. Things were a bit different then. Our lodge held Ordeal weekend in the spring and Brotherhood weekend in the fall. There was no opportunity to complete the Ordeal in the fall (or Brotherhood in the spring). Full lodge meetings were held on Sunday of each work weekend with lodge elections being held at one of them. I believe it was the spring weekends, but I could be wrong.

In addition to lodge meetings taking place at work weekends, lodge meetings were also held monthly at the Letchworth District Roundtable in Geneseo. These meetings were probably what we now call Lodge Executive Committee meetings. The lodge officers and key three would meet together, usually while committees were having their meetings and the ceremonies team practiced.

The lodge had several active committees, such as: Where to go Camping, Ceremonies, Elections, and Camp Promotions. The ceremonies team uses the same head-dresses (at least they look like the same ones) that were in use in the lodge 35 years ago. Believe it or not, politics was actually involved in the election and selection of officers and committee chairs! Candidates for lodge chief actively campaigned before and during the weekend of the election. They usually could count on the support of their troop members in the lodge, alliances might be created with other troops, and candidates for office might even have a platform they ran on.

If I recall correctly, Hugh Ten Hagen of Warsaw was lodge chief when I became an Ordeal member, followed by Greg Johnson (Geneseo) in 1975. It was fun to serve on the ceremonies teams for two years and to assist with publishing our lodge's "Where to go Camping" booklet. By some stroke of adolescent genius, I wrote to Carol A. Edson, Jr. His reply was included as the foreword of the booklet, and our initial communication would lead to his attendance at the next Lodge #339 father and son winter banquet. This was probably in 1976.

In 1985-1986 I was an assistant Cubmaster and Webelos leader in the Trans-Atlantic Council. I transferred my lodge membership to Black Eagle Lodge. When I returned to the area in 1986, I transferred back to Geneseo Council and Lodge #339. I was asked to serve as Unit Commissioner for the Scout Troops and Cub Packs in York, Leicester, and Mt. Morris and attended "Commissioner's College" run by Dave Cargill. I recall attending a Saturday work weekend at Barlow's cabin where we removed the wooden floor and another weekend when the concrete floor was poured. I think Dave Konopka was lodge adviser at the time, however this may have been in 1980 when I was home.

Things like college, family and career have a way of interfering with the best of intentions and in 1988 I was not able to continue as an active volunteer. When my son became a Webelos scout in 2000, it was the perfect opportunity to become re-involved. Our troop did not usually attend Roundtable, but I was asked to attend the next monthly meeting. It should not have been a surprise to find Dave Hawley still working the registration table.

Although it would be a few years before my son became a member of the OA, I again found myself attending spring and fall weekends. That evolved into also attending LEC's and then becoming more actively involved with our lodge.

The LEC meetings begin at 7 P.M. and end around 8:30 P.M.

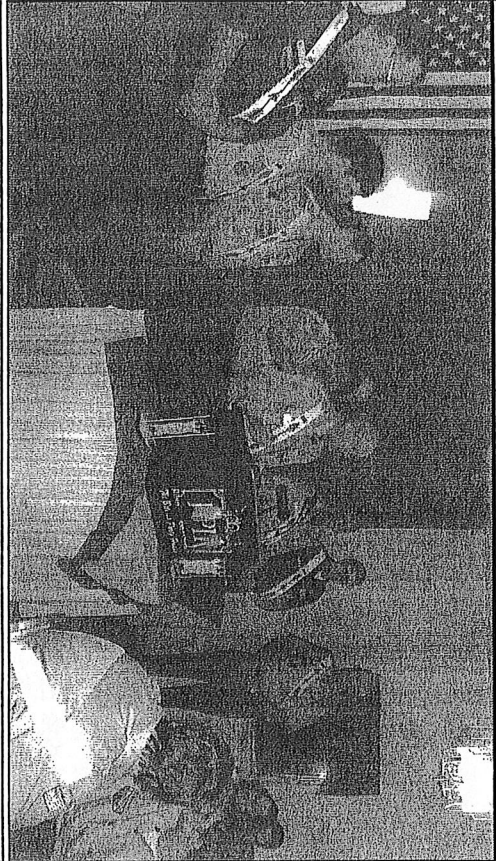
Mailing List and Dues Payment

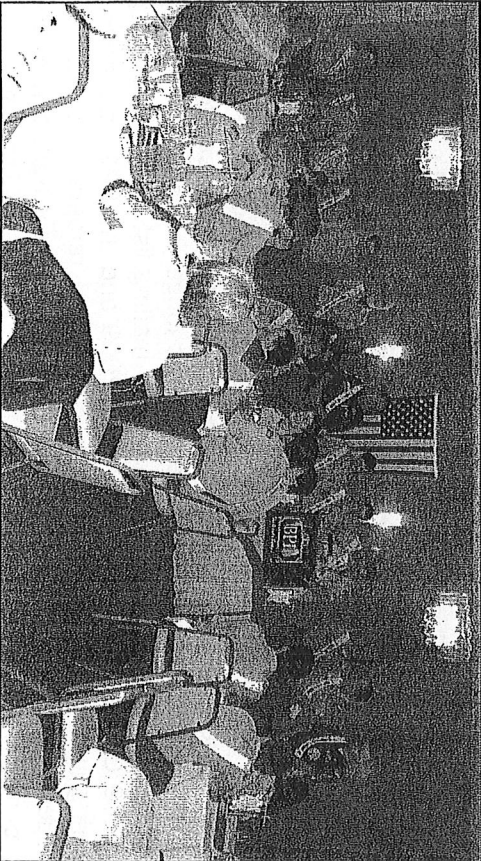

ORDEAL WEEKEND PRICE CHANGES

As a result of concerns regarding the price charged to attend work weekends, our lodge conducted an informal survey of other lodges and their fees for candidates and members at work weekends. We also determined our cost for candidates and members. Because the cost of sashes and books has risen, we must raise our prices. The cost increase is similar to what other lodges in our section charge candidates and members.

New Ordeal, Brotherhood and Member prices/weekend:

Ordeal Candidates \$35.00 (Sash, flap, book, dues, meals)

Brotherhood Candidates \$31.00 (Sash, dues, meals)

Members \$15.00—please note members arriving on Saturdays are expected to register on arrival and ensure their payment has been received and recorded.

LODGE COMMUNICATIONS

Lodge communications are very important. Is your OA Troop Representative providing up-to-date information about Lodge activities and events? Are you receiving the Lodge newsletter? Do you know OA members in your troop who aren't getting the newsletter? Do you receive Lodge e-mail?

Don't wait for your troop representative if he isn't doing his job. We need your help. Ask for time at your troop meeting to meet with OA members. Find out who isn't receiving the newsletter. Send us their names. We will make sure they are on the mailing list. Send us phone numbers and e-mail addresses for your troop OA members. All OA members in your troop should go to the council website and sign-up for the electronic mailing list. At the top of the Council webpage there is a button "Join E-Mail List". Click that button and select the list (OA) you want to join. This will be very important in the future as we send a lot more information by e-mail.

History of the Vigil Honor, by Mr. Jerry Vukman

The Order of the Arrow was founded in 1915 at Treasure Island by E. Urner Goodman and Carroll A. Edson. In 1915, E. Urner Goodman became the first Vigil member. The Vigil was reserved for those special Arrowmen who gave exceptional service, personal effort and unselfish interest that made distinguished contributions beyond their immediate responsibilities. (OA Handbook 1997)

On June 2, 1934, at the National Council Annual Meeting in Buffalo, NY, the Order of the Arrow program was approved by the National Council. In May 1948, the Executive Board, upon recommendation of its committee on Camping, officially integrated the Order of the Arrow into the Scouting Movement. The Order of the Arrow's National Lodge was dissolved and Supervision shifted to the Boy Scouts of America. (OA Handbook 1977).

The Vigil Honor has NO list of requirements to fulfill. The Vigil Honor cannot be won by conscious endeavor, but instead, altruistic leadership in Service. The one and only definite requirement for the Vigil is Brotherhood membership tenure.

In 1950, Brotherhood membership was required for 3 years. (OA Handbook 1950 from Don Ames). By 1961, this was reduced to the present 2 year Brotherhood membership. Until the 1970's, the number of Vigils selected was based on new Ordeal members inducted at the rate of one per twenty-five new Ordeals (OA Handbook 1950 & 1961). By 1977, this was changed to one per fifty Lodge members (OA Handbook 1977).

For those at the Lodge Banquet in January, they were able to look at the Plaque of Vigil members from Amo'chk Lodge from 1955 through 1968. In that time period only two to four new Vigils were inducted per year. There are still a few of these "old Vigils" active in our Lodge. We will try and bring the plaque to Spring Weekend.

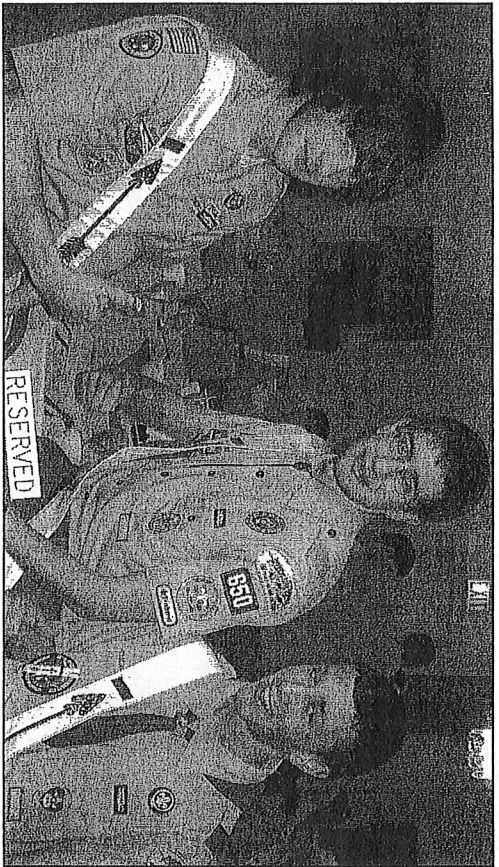
I believe that Order of the Arrow National Board decided that the Vigil be made more available by increasing the number of new Vigils that may be inducted to encourage members to stay active. Today, if we were on the old standard of new Ordeals inducted, we would only be able to select three or four new Vigils. This year, we had seven Vigil petitions available. This is where the Founder's Award was started. It replaced the Vigil in difficulty to attain - that though, is another subject.

The Order of the Arrow is a Brotherhood of Cheerful Service. This means we work. The work can be easy and the work can be less than pleasurable, but we do the work to benefit others. To the youth reading this, you need to find a way to make work fun and enjoyable, no matter how distasteful. If you do not find a way to make work fun and rewarding, you will enjoy a miserable existence for forty-fifty years after you finish your schooling (Personal opinion)

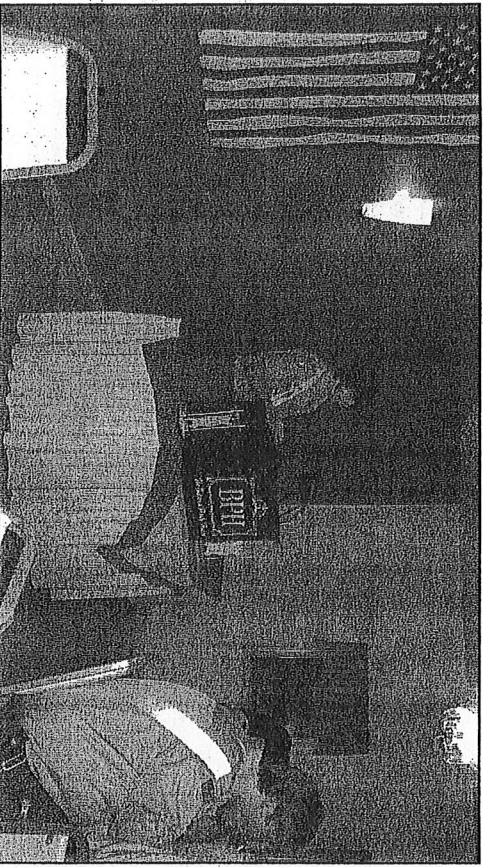
In closing, The Vigil Honor is an award that finds the recipient, the recipient does not find the award. Those selected for the Vigil Honor are selected not so much for what they have done in the past, but what is expected of them in the future. Proof is evident in the number of Vigils who have been active for decades in our Lodge. Lastly, do your jobs, do them well, be cheerful and have fun while you do it. Whether you attain Vigil or not may not matter because you will have developed a personal way of life that will serve you well throughout your life.

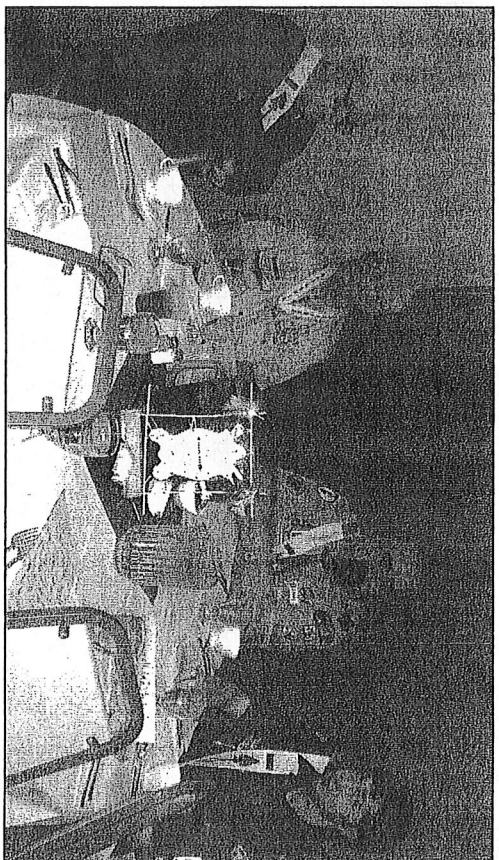
