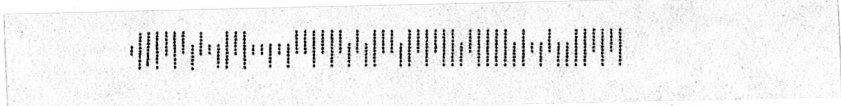

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

WORDS FROM OUR LODGE CHIEF

EXCERPTS FROM THE STATE OF THE LODGE REPORT

First, I would like to start off with our commitment to the outdoor program. This past summer, we had 26 OA members on Camp Staff, which made up 75% of our council camp staff. We had several people go out to promote our camps to troops that continue to return, and to troops that have never been to our camps before. During the Camp Dittmer camp season, we hosted an ice cream social that was open to everyone in camp. Many lodge brothers helped serve the ice cream and clean up.

We held two ordeal weekends. The first one in the spring was held at Camp Sam Wood, where we set up the Cub Scout camp for the summer. Some of the projects we did included setting up the tents, putting in a water diversion system, clearing brush, and much more. The second ordeal weekend was held in the fall at Camp Dittmer. At Camp Dittmer, we closed down the camp for the winter. This involved folding all the tents, storing all the cots, repairing cots, and doing some landscaping by the new shower house. This past November we had our annual fun weekend at Camp Sam Wood. We were able to obtain a wood splitter from Elitsac Lumber; we split the wood in the parking lot and put it at the director's cabin; and the campfire circle. We estimate that we had a total of 4,687 man hours donated in total to both camps.

As of now, our total membership in the lodge is 274. We have 106 ordeal members, 93 brotherhood members, and 75 vigil honor members. This past year we inducted 62 ordeal members, converted 23 brotherhood members, and had 6 members receive vigil honor. Fortunately, we had a 34% brotherhood conversion, which helped our Lodge qualify as a quality lodge.

We have had a productive year, and I hope that there are more. I would like to see more youth come involved in our lodge. It is the youth that help our lodge grow; they're the ones that will continue our traditions and take our lodge into the future.

Does your unit have an OA Troop Representative?

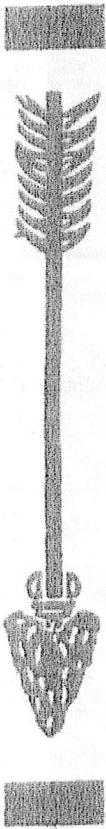

Greetings from our new Lodge Adviser

Hi,

My name is Mike McNutt and I was introduced as the new lodge advisor at the annual lodge banquet and patch auction. There are probably a lot of people who don't know much about me so I will start with a brief of my scouting years.

I joined Cub Scouts (Pack 531, Akron, NY) when I was in third grade, earning Bobcat and Bear, and crossing into Boy Scouts after Webelos. I was in Troop 559 (Akron) for 1 year, skipped a year and joined Troop 463 in Clarence NY. While in Troop 463 I moved up through the ranks to Life Scout, held a position in the Leadership Corps and was Troop Quartermaster.

I was elected into the Order of the Arrow in 1977 in Ho-De-No-Sau-Nee Lodge 159. It seems the task is much lighter when we join together and work side by side with old friends and new friends.

I see many good and admirable things in the youth of our lodge and look forward to serving with them for the good of our lodge. 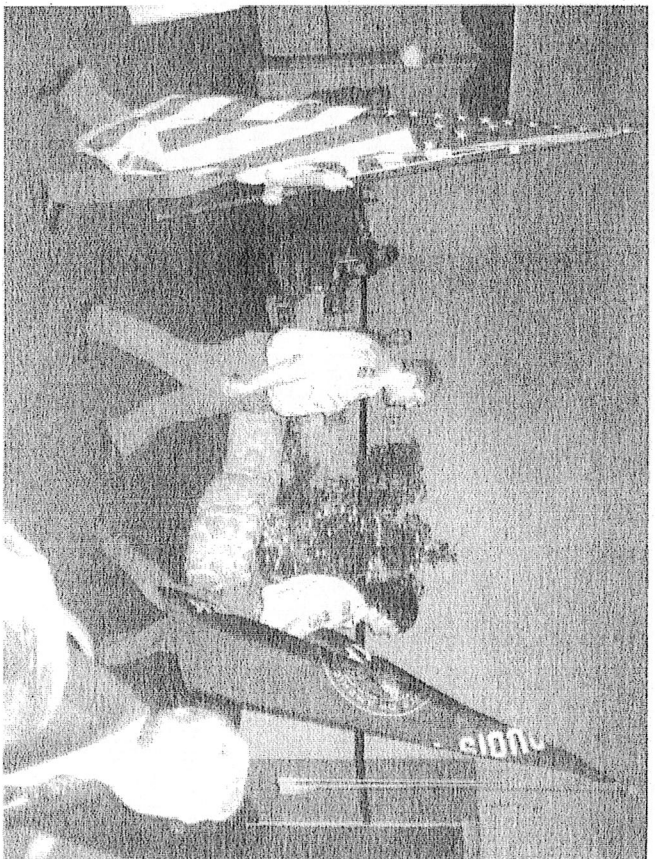
The LEC meetings begin at 7 P.M. and end around 8:30 P.M.

Introducing: the De Walt Crew

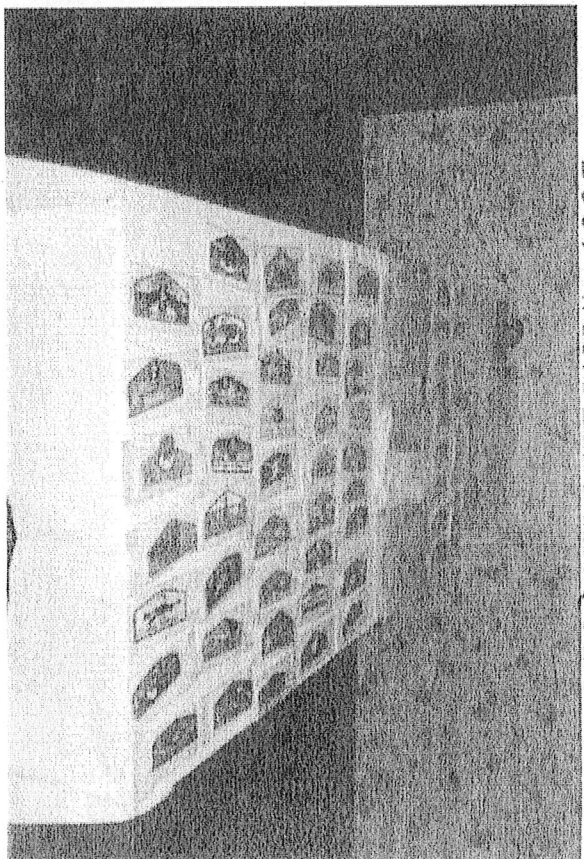

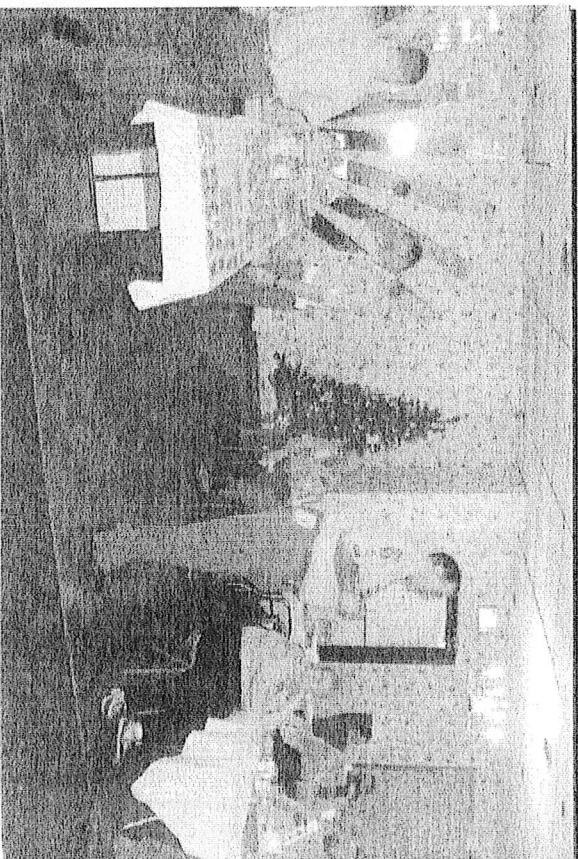

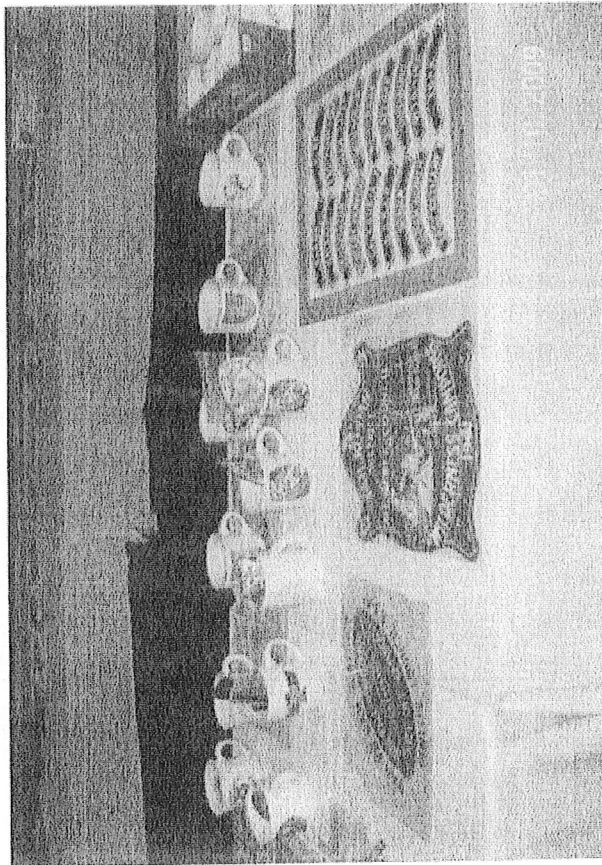
